Assignment 1: Assessment tools in Motor Speech Disorders			
Assignment description: To search databases, locate, analyze, assess, and summarize ONE management tool for individuals with motor speech disorders. On submission date students are asked to submit a hard copy of the re along with PowerPoint presentation to summarize and present the selected test in front of his/her colleagues (group will have 5-10 minutes to present) followed by open discussions among students class.			
Assignment objective:	To explore intervention tools that are valid and reliable and useful in motor speech disorders assessment with a concentration in speech pathology.

23. Course Policies:

A- Attendance policies:

- Attendance will be taken periodically throughout the semester.
- Students are expected to attend and actively participate in all classes.
