A- Aims:

This undergraduate level course focuses on the clinical skills in basic audiology testing, the student is expected to have good understanding of the pure tone audiometric testing with and without masking.

- Develop good understanding of tympanometry and acoustic reflexes.
- 2. Develop understanding of pure tone audiometry and masking skills.
- 3. Develop good understanding of speech audiometry.
- 4. Be able to interpret the results of evaluation.
- 5. Be able to apply the techniques acquired during coure to test children with special needs.

23. Course Policies:

A- Attendance policies:

- Attendance will be taken periodically throughout the semester.
- Students are expected to attend and actively participate in all classes.
- Students are expected to be on time.
- When the student is unable to attend class, it is a courtesy to notify the instructor in advance using either e-mail or phone.
- Repeated tardiness or leaving early will not be accepted.
