This infrastructure module is essential for building the identity of students as occupational therapists. This is by introducing students to core concepts of occupational therapy such as: meaningful occupation, health, and quality of life, and by introducing the interrelations of those basic concepts with each other. Also this module aims to introduce students to the general theories and approaches of occupational therapy.

20 Course aims and outcomes:

A- Aims:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will demonstrate an understanding of the definition of occupational therapy, history and evolution of the profession and the major founders will be studies and their contribution to the profession. Emphasis is on providing a basic understanding of the profession's language by studying the Occupational therapy practice framework (OTPF) and the International Classification of function, disability and health (ICF). This course covers topics like occupational science, clinical reasoning and role of occupational therapy across the continuum and within the rehabilitation team. The students are expected to begin to develop interaction and observation skills.

24 Course Policies:

- A- Attendance policies:
 - Attendance will be taken in every class throughout the semester.
 - Students are expected to attend and actively participate in all classes.
 - Students are expected to be on time.
 - When the student is unable to attend class, it is a courtesy to notify the instructor in advance using e-mail.
 - Repeated tardiness or leaving early will not be accepted.
 - Students who miss class (or any portion of class) are responsible for the content. Any student who misses a class has the responsibility for obtaining copies of notes, handouts, assignments, etc. from classmates who were present. If additional assistance is still necessary, an appointment should be scheduled with the instructor. Class time is not to be used to go over material with students who missed class(es).
 - An absence of more than 15% of all the number of classes, which is equivalent of (2) classes, requires that the student provides an official excuse to the instructor and the dean.
 - If the excuse was accepted the student is required to withdraw from the module.
 - If the excuse was rejected the student will fail the module and mark of zero will be assigned as stated in the laws and regulations of the University of Jordan. Please refer to pages 133 and 134 of the student handbook.
- B- Absences from exams and submitting assignments on time:
 - The instructor will not do any make-up exams.
 - Exceptions for make-up exams and late submission of class assignments will be made on a case-by-case basis for true personal emergencies that are described as accepted by the regulations of UJ (e.g., documented medical, personal, or family emergency).
 - Except for the final exam, make-up exams will be arranged if justifications for missing the exam satisfy the above. It is the student's responsibility provide an excuse for the absence within three days to schedule a make-up session. Otherwise, the recorded score for that exam for the student will be a zero.
 - Late assignments will not be accepted and submission of assignments (due to unjustified absence from class) by other students will not be accepted regardless of how much work the student put into its preparation.
