modification and socket designing are performed. Students will be then trained on how to assemble the prosthesis and align it correctly to fit patient's needs.

- 1- Classify different levels of lower and upper limb amputation and recognize the procedure of the amputation and the related management
- 2- Determine proper prosthetic components of different lower limb prostheses and demonstrate skills required to fabricate lower limb prostheses.
- 3- Recognize the psychological effect of limb loss and disability and identify their influence on prosthetic and orthotic management.

24 Course Policies:

- 1- Attendance policies:
- 1- Attendance will be taken periodically throughout the semester.
- 2- Students are expected to attend and actively participate in all classes.
- 3- Students are expected to be on time.
- 4- When the student is unable to attend class, it is a courtesy to notify the instructor in advance using either e-mail.
- 5- Repeated tardiness or leaving early will not be accepted.
- 6- Students who miss class (or any portion of class) are responsible for the content. Any student who misses a class has the responsibility for obtaining copies of notes, handouts,



- assignments, etc. from class members who were present. If additional assistance is still necessary, an appointment should be scheduled with the instructor. Class time is not to be used to go over material with students who missed class(es).
- 7- An absence of more than 15% of all the number of classes, which is equivalent of (2) classes, requires that the student provides an official excuse to the instructor and the dean.
- 8- If the excuse was accepted the student is required to withdraw from the module.
- 9- If the excuse was rejected the student will fail the module and mark of zero will be assigned as suggested by the laws and regulations of the University of Jordan. Please refer to pages 133, 134 of the student handbook.
- 10- Absences from exams and submitting assignments on time:
- 1- The instructor will not do any make-up exams.

- 3- Make-up exams will be arranged if justifications for missing the exam satisfy the above.
